Checklist for Conveners

Review study guide.
Identify community allies.
Find local "experts" (district liaison to homeless children, local shelter director, Youth Service Bureau, local shelter volunteer coordinator, child and family service worker, school counselor or social worker, alternative school personnel).
Set a date (after consulting your allies and experts).
Reserve a room and equipment for viewing the documentary. (Make sure the audio and video are good quality!)
Invite press to attend.
Publicize the event: newspaper(s), radio, and flyers (see sample press release, radio announcement, and flyer).
Recruit three discussion leaders for small groups.
Arrange for volunteers to bring refreshments and greet participants.
Check HEAR US for one small advocacy act that participants can take immediately.
Prepare a program (agenda for the event, contacts, and the "one small act" information).
Duplicate programs and handouts. Duplicate packets for groups.
Collect supplies such as a chart and marker for each group to make notes, memo pads and pencils for participants.
Prepare a sign-in sheet.
Arrive early and set up for the meeting.
Make contact with participants who signed in, asking for help with implementing ideas proposed in the meeting.
If possible, let HEAR US know how the event went. Sending copies of any news coverage is helpful.

Sample Press Release

Most people think of homelessness as an urban problem affecting adult males. Unfortunately, more and more families in rural areas and small towns are homeless. A local group wants to raise awareness about homeless children with the idea of doing something about it. Facts about Homelessness

- Over three million people will experience homelessness this year.
- Approximately half of these people will be children and youth.
- Families are the fastest-growing segment of the homeless population.
- To afford the national median fair market rent for a two-bedroom rental unit, a minimum wage worker would need to work 97 hours per week.
- The McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Assistance Act requires public schools to immediately enroll students experiencing homelessness even when lacking proof of residency, birth certificates and school records, immunization records, and fee money or materials.
- Homeless families exist in virtually every community.

Suggested Meeting Format

Introductions (5 minutes)

Introduce conveners and speaker(s) and any VIP guests (mayor, city council...)

Short background on how documentary was made. (5 minutes)

Diane Nilan was the director of a homeless shelter for years, watching as the problem of homelessness grew in the United States. Finally she sold her town house, moved into an RV, and began a cross-country trip to raise awareness and sensitivity to the near "invisible" problem of homeless families. Along the way, she videotaped children and young people who courageously agreed to share their stories about being homeless. With fifty hours of videotape and a dream to let children's voices be heard, she found Dr. Laura Vazquez, a communication professor at Northern Illinois University. Together they created *My Own Four Walls*.

My Own Four Walls (22 minutes)

After video, allow a minute or two for it to "sink in" and then ask for reactions. (10 minutes)

Was there anything that really struck you?

Was anything here new to you?

Panel or Speaker (30 minutes)

Suggested topics:

Assessment of local problem

Local resources

Unmet needs

Ways for community groups to help ease homelessness

Time for questions

"One simple act," an advocacy task that everyone can do (5 minutes)

Refer to the "take action" link at <u>www.hearus.us</u> for up-to-date advocacy information. Key information should be on the program handout

Read descriptions of the three groups and introduce group conveners. Attendees select their own groups. (5 minutes)

Poverty: Low wages and lack of affordable housing are a prime cause of homelessness. This group will explore the relationship between poverty and homelessness as well as hear what other communities are doing to help working families afford housing.

Common Stresses on Families: Children are expensive and exhausting! When family members also face other stressors such as sickness or injury, lack of health care insurance, transportation problems, mental health problems, substance abuse, or domestic violence, the consequences can be very harmful for children. Family stressors can contribute to homelessness or result from it. Find out more about family stressors and how to effectively support families through tough times.

Effects on Children and Youth: Loneliness, anxiety, health problems, hunger, and educational disadvantage are some of the problems plaguing homeless children and young people.

Find out how community members can directly ease these harmful effects through donations of time, material goods, or money.

Small groups (20 minutes)

Reassemble the whole group and hear reports and action ideas from each small group. (15 minutes)

Organize to take action (5 minutes)

Identify people to take the lead on ideas coming out of small groups. If there are several community groups represented in the meeting, consider forming a task force with representatives from each group.

Suggested Action Activities

- Check with local shelters or programs serving homeless families to find out their needs (volunteers, food, supplies, seasonal clothing, money, etc.)
- Identify local school district homeless liaison, make contact, and inquire as to their needs.
- Inform school district about the video My Own Four Walls.
- Organize individuals or groups willing to commit a reasonable amount of time to advocacy projects for homeless families, children or youth.
- The sky's the limit! Just check to make sure the need is there and your commitment is solid.



☐ What happens when you call/write your legislator?

- They first perk up about the issue you're contacting them about...
- If enough people call/write, they'll look into the issue...
- If enough contact is made, a law can be passed or be amended...
- Democracy works!

□ Pointers...

- Be brief and clear. BILL NUMBERS are important.
- Don't be nasty!
- You'll probably talk to a staffer or voicemail. That counts!
- They're busy, and probably don't know your issue. YOU'RE THE EXPERT!
- Ask for specifics—sponsor a bill, vote yes/no...
- It's your right and responsibility!

10 GOOD REASONS TO ADVOCATE FOR AN END TO HOMELESSNESS:

HOMELESSNESS HURTS...

- 1. It hurts those who experience it firsthand.
- 2. It hurts loved ones who see their family/friends struggle with homelessness.
- 3. It hurts the whole community, affecting the quality of life.
- 4. It hurts our entire country, reflecting a lack of respect for lives of all people.

HOMELESSNESS ADVOCACY CAN HELP...

- 5. Caring and compassion are qualities that spread, causing immediate and long-term results.
- 6. Those struggling with homelessness often lack the wherewithal to contact their legislators.
- 7. Many people, including legislators, don't understand homelessness.
- 8. Homelessness has fallen off the political agenda in our state and federal capitals.
- 9. Involved, concerned citizens can change that!
- 10. Tremendous legislative improvements have been accomplished thanks to involved, concerned citizens...*like you!*
